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Why medical bills must be an election issue

If you were watching the ABC's Four Corners you will have seen a deeper than usual report into the escalating medical bills Australians are facing. It's an issue we've been highlighting for a number of years. And it's been a major issue ever since the Coalition came to power, first under Abbott and now under Turnbull; the government has hit Australians hard with ever increasing healthcare costs by freezing Medicare rebates for a range of services even though charges are increasing.

At the last federal election the issue of rising healthcare costs was quite damaging to the Coalition, especially given the fact they had chosen to freeze Medicare rebates on vital things like pathology tests and diagnostic imaging. It meant that hundreds of thousands of Australians saw out-of-pocket expenses skyrocket and as illustrated in the Four Corners report the out-of-pocket expenses are still increasing.

What was largely ignored by the Four Corners report was the ever increasing gap payments people are making around pathology testing. Testing as you know is an absolutely vital part in the diagnosis and treatment of people requiring medical care. Without the testing it's not possible to pinpoint the exact cause of someone's health complaint or how to best treat it. And with the federal government continuing the rebate freeze on testing, it is adding thousands of dollars to people's healthcare costs. Despite the government announcing in this year's federal budget the unfreezing of rebates for diagnostic imaging, Australians will still be forced to pay ever larger gap fees for pathology tests.

And with stagnant wages, growing inequality at work, and ever increasing living costs, more and

more Australians are finding themselves making tough decisions about whether they should seek medical assistance or pay the rent/mortgage and bills. These are decisions Australians should not be forced to make in such a rich country like ours. But instead of recognising the skyrocketing out-of-pocket costs for healthcare the federal government has entrenched higher costs for Australians every time they need to get a pathology test done.

When the next federal election comes around, it's vital that we make it about healthcare costs and ensuring that every Australian, regardless of their capacity to pay, is able to access pathology tests when they need it. The federal government cannot continue to back cuts to company taxes while it allows ordinary Australians who pay their taxes to be left struggling with escalating costs in accessing quality healthcare.

In the meantime we will continue lobbying for change and making sure we continue to deliver the best outcomes for you, our members.

Discussions in relation to the Dorevitch draft agreement has commenced but as has been flagged this discussion will take time as we go through multiple agreements line by line.

We have asked for an agreed operative date for any first wage increase and we are still waiting for Dorevitch's response.

Australian Clinical Labs

Enterprising bargaining is underway for a new agreement to cover all scientists and technicians at Australian Clinical Labs.

A big part of that work will be bringing together the former Healthscope and St John of God agreements to ensure that members do not lose conditions. Another obvious issue will be to ensure a decent pay rise for all members.

As a part of the process, we also think it is important to ask you directly what you think should go into the union's claim. A short survey is being conducted by the MSAV in conjunction with VAHPA who share coverage of technicians with us.



Backfilling at Alfred Health

A couple of months ago the Union lodged a dispute with Alfred Health in relation to staffing levels in Haematology.

Through the course of the dispute it quickly became evident that there was 5.3 EFT worth of vacancies in Haematology due to factors like staff returning part time from maternity leave, resignations, and on other long term leave arrangements. Because of the new backfill provisions in the agreement, Alfred Health eventually accepted that these vacancies had to be filled immediately.

We have been advised that so far 4.8 EFT has been filled with the remainder currently being advertised. The Union will continue to monitor the situation so that the remaining EFT is also filled.

This is an excellent outcome and a great example of why it's vital that members inform us of vacant positions in their workplace. We would have not known about such a massive gap in staffing at Alfred without members informing us.

This dispute also illustrated that the new leave backfill provisions in Public Health Sector are very effective in addressing staffing and workload issues.

Queen's Birthday Public Holiday



Worth Reading: Remote village to metropolis: how globalisation spreads infectious diseases

"These days we can get from most remote villages [anywhere to home in 36 hours](#). And migrating humans can certainly carry microbial "passengers". This means the increasing globalisation of our world can give infectious diseases a good opportunity to spread.

In the age of exploration, introduced infections played a [major role in shaping human history](#). Although the origins of the 1918 Spanish Flu pandemic are hotly debated, the timing of its onset in Europe coincided with mass troop movements towards the end of the first world war. It probably came with [American troops](#) from Camp Funston in Kansas.

More recently, it's thought HIV/AIDS emerged early in the 20th century, but only in the 1960s did it spread along [transport routes](#) in Africa.

Developed countries, particularly those like Australia that are geographically isolated, often feel relatively protected from epidemics. But travellers have introduced cases of Ebola to the [US and Europe](#), brought SARS from Asia to [Canada](#), and MERS coronavirus from Saudi Arabia to [South Korea](#). Recent studies have highlighted the risk of [importation](#) of antibiotic-resistant bacteria from countries where resistance is more common."

Worth Reading: Climate change: a brief overview of the science and health impacts for Australia

"In 2017, The Lancet reported that "human symptoms of climate change are unequivocal and potentially irreversible — affecting the health of populations around the world today" and added that the "delayed response to climate change over the past 25 years has jeopardised human life and livelihoods".¹ The gravity of this situation warrants inspection, and urgent action. In this article, our aim is to provide an overview of the most recent scientific and organisational literature to inform readers about the current state of knowledge on climate change and its relationship to human health. The issue has global relevance, but here we focus primarily on Australia.

The ambient climate shapes cultural life, so the relationship between human societies and their climate is extremely powerful. Ecological services such as food and water resources, strategies required to feed a community throughout the year, clothing, and housing design are all determined by climate and its direct threats of heat, droughts, fires, storms and floods. Indeed, human survival and societal flourishing depend on successful adaptation to the proclivities of regional climate."
